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Campus walk for Lauren Smith-Fields “What do we want; justice”

On Wednesday, Feb. 23, the Black Student Union held a justice walk for Lauren Smith-Fields. Smith-Fields has gotten national attention for the way her death was handled. The Bridgeport woman, 23, was found dead after a man she went on a Bumble date with called the police saying he found her unresponsive. Bumble is an online dating app created in 2014. The police failed to notify the Smith-Fields family of their daughter's passing, and also didn't make the white, male, Bumble date a suspect. Bridgeport Mayor, Joseph Ganim said in a statement that he is "extremely disappointed with the leadership of the Bridgeport Police Department and find actions taken up to this point unacceptable." The two original detectives on the case have been suspended.

Mya Yorke, 22, Biology Major and President of BSU wanted to put this walk together for Smith-Fields because of how the aftermath of the event lacked justice. "Being a black woman in America, a lot of this goes unnoticed so when it happens in your own backyard [Bridgeport, Conn.] you want to do something about it," Yorke said. "our

lives [as black women] are seen as inconsequential. They do not take us seriously until we actually tell them what we need to do. Until we apply pressure they really don't care."

The walk started in the Residential Life Quad

that using their voices as a community is a way to hopefully prevent the same injustices from happening again. "We cannot be silent because silence is actually violence," Stanton said.

Diane Ariza, Vice President of Diversion, Equity, and Inclusion, was the final speaker before the BSU hosted justice walk. She started off by thanking the Black Student Union for taking time to organize and honor an event for Smith-Fields.

"But, the call for justice does not stop here with these women. How do we call for justice for the number of women of color, who continue to be unseen and invisible to larger society?" Ariza said.

Leyana McKeithen, 20, Psychology major, was a participant in the justice walk. "I wanted to be a part of this walk because I believe this is a very serious problem in America. I know walking in this event may not solve the problem but at least we're bringing awareness to it," Leyana said. "I like attending events like this so it was great to see this on my own campus."

The walk lasted about 10 minutes and got a lot of positive attention throughout the campus by spectators. Both staff and students attended the event.



justice walk before participants marched down to the library. The event started off with knowledge, statistics, opinions, and feelings surrounding the injustice of black people and more specifically Lauren Smith-Fields.

"Unfortunately black women are the most disrespected and unprotected [demographic] in this

Dawn Stanton said. This devastating case reminded her that for many in this society, black lives don't matter, black girls' lives don't matter, and black women's lives don't matter. "The police are supposed to protect and serve not to neglect," Stanton stated.

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Water issues arise in Schwartz Hall

A video and petition were created by university students due to issues regarding the water in Schwartz Hall.

The video posted by @jonandjanionair goes into detail about how the water has been coming out brown and has also been burning students, they have also found rust in it. This led to him talking about the petition, which has 125 signatures and is still growing.

"It came up, actually previously Wednesday at the Residence Hall Association meeting, and Marvin Wilson, who's our social director at residence life, reached out to facilities to talk to the residence hall director here about the issue," Director of Residence Life Robert DeMezzo said. "We discovered that New Haven indicated that because the fire that occurred down the street, an apartment built complex, they had a large-armed fire when that much water goes through the water main, it could stir off."

Associate Vice President for Capital Budgeting & Facilities Operations, Eric Lessne said that the university sent out tests with the Regional Water Authority and a private

contractor to test the water in certain rooms that have been having many problems with this issue.

"I believe this week we

asked them to test the water here at Schwartz Hall and they did. We also asked for that water to go to an independent

lab to be tested as well," DeMezzo said. "So, we tested it here at the water main, and we did go up to the third floor because

that's kind of where the complaints came from, and tested water in a few rooms. They told me that they received preliminary

results that said the water was safe."

DeMezzo said that the water is cleaned every week by the Regional Water Authority and because of this it may cause some discoloration to the water.

"Out of caution, we ask facilities to get the water tested," DeMezzo said. "They actually test the water in the water main every week, the regional what already does it, which is the New Haven water company."

While students who live in the dorm have noticed discoloration, others have not.

"My roommate and I have not had any issues regarding the water issue," early childhood education major, Kylee Gustafson, a sophomore said.

She has seen the video regarding this issue.

"I think the university is doing a good job by keeping the dorm safe for students by doing many tests on the water," she said.

Some students have not noticed any changes in the water.

"I haven't been affected by the water," healthcare studies, Quinesha McQueen, a sophomore said.

@jonandjanionair declined to comment on the video they created.

The petition creators were not available for comment.

“Exact death tolls are unclear, but the U.N. human rights chief said 102 civilians have been killed and hundreds wounded in five days of fighting — warning that figure was likely a vast undercount — and Ukraine’s president said at least 16 children were among the dead,” according to AP news.

“More than 500,000 people have fled the country since the invasion, another U.N. official said Monday — among millions who have left their homes.”

This could be the United States, but many people do not want to think about that, instead they want to live in ignorant bliss, like done with everything else that does not directly involve the United States. While we can donate and we can share on social media, it does not change the fact that people are dying in a country that has been independent from Russia for 31 years.

“U.S. and British officials played down Putin’s nuclear threat as posturing. But for many, they stirred up memories of the Cuban Missile Crisis and concerns that the West could be drawn into a direct conflict with Russia,” according to AP news.

While the United States is not being impacted directly there are still issues in the country happening due to Russia starting this invasion.

“President Biden, meanwhile, has said he would consider measures to blunt the impact of rising

oil prices on Americans, including the sale of more oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve. He warned energy companies not to opportunistically jack up prices, while acknowledging that the economic consequences of Russia’s invasion of Ukraine would be felt by Americans,” according to The Washington Post.

This means the gas prices will skyrocket more than they already have been. And what does President Biden have to say about this.

He added that the government is “closely monitoring energy supplies for any disruption” and raised the potential the U.S. could further tap its petroleum reserves if conditions warrant. The president also fired a warning shot at oil and gas giants themselves, adding they “should not exploit this moment to hike their prices,” according to The Washington Post.

The university is known for being a commuter school and with gas prices going up it will make it harder for some students to be able to come to campus. So, while the United States is not getting bombed, we will be facing major inflation in the next couple of months, due to this invasion of Ukraine.

“I can barely afford my groceries now. Like, I’m literally walking in there with my last hundred dollars,” Sammy Yelle said in an interview with NPR.

Due to Russia invading Ukraine many Americans are taking Russian made products, including vodka, off their shelves. I have also seen many restaurants that are Russian putting the Ukrainian flag in their windows or other areas of the building to show that they stand with Ukraine.

“Maybe I’m cynical, but it seems like with the divisions that we’ve been seeing just in our own country of nationalist ideals that the world is a ripe ground for this kind of conflict,” Heidi Kretzer said in an interview with NPR.

While we can send money or we can post on social media this will not help the current status of Ukraine, the fact is yes, this can be used when it is all over, but will they have a country to rebuild once it is over.



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Lady Owls advance in NE10 tourney It took overtime, but women's basketball advance to NE quarterfinals

A thriller of a game had James Moore Field House rocking this past Saturday as women's basketball took down the Assumption University Greyhounds in overtime in the first round of the NE10 Conference tournament.

The game was back and forth throughout, but just when it looked like the Owls were going to pull away late in the contest, up 47-37 in the fourth quarter, the Greyhounds came racing back, going on a 13-0 run to take the lead and force the Owls to call a timeout to re-group.

"We weren't really scoring. We couldn't get the looks that we wanted to," guard Delaney Connors, a senior, said. "It's a game of runs in basketball and that was their run and we just had to counter that when we had the opportunity."

And counter they did. Out of the timeout, guard Zoe Amalbert, a senior, drilled a clutch three-pointer to tie the score at 50 with just over one minute left in regulation.

Amalbert said: "I just knew that we had to get a good possession and we've been running that play a lot recently, so it was called for me if I was open, but it was a kind of read-and-react and I just ended up being open, and I knew I was going to take

that shot."

The Greyhounds retook the lead following a timeout with 31 seconds left. The Owls would need a bucket in order to save their season.

On the ensuing possession, Amalbert found Connors cutting to the basket, who hit the layup with 18 seconds left to tie it up at 52.

The home crowd, which included the lacrosse team as well as Otis the Owl was really into it at this point, hoping their team could force a defensive stop and overtime.

The Owls did just what they needed, getting the

stop to force overtime.

The overtime period came up all Owls, specifically Connors, who dominated the five-minute stretch by scoring eight points and finishing with 23 for the game.

She even scored on a layup strikingly similar to the one she scored to tie the game at the end of regulation.

"We put that play in a couple days ago, and I knew we just needed that to take us forward and I was just happy to be open both times," Connors said.

Connors really put the final nail in the Greyhounds' coffin when

she nailed a three-pointer to put the Owls up 61-56 with 39 seconds left, forcing the Greyhounds to call timeout.

Laser-focused as ever, forward Jessica Fressle, a graduate student, immediately shouted "Defense!" to her teammates on the bench to make sure they were engaged for the final possessions.

Fressle is the Owls leading scorer and rebounder for the season, as she was in this game and is their vocal leader on the court, constantly communicating with teammates.

"That's always been my thing. That's what got me recruited to this level. It's one of those things that you can't teach. It's just something that I do and have always done," Fressle said. "Usually it's just positivity. It's just picking everyone else up and by picking everyone else up, I'm picking myself up."

Fressle would knock down a free throw to seal the 65-58 win and finish with a game-high 24 points and career-high 20 rebounds, in addition to four steals. Big players show up in big moments.

Connors and her late-game heroics netted 23 points on an efficient nine of 13 shooting.

Amalbert also had a great performance to the tune of a double-double, with 12 points and 10 assists.

"This team is so special, and we just proved that out there," Connors said. "I'm really excited right now. We're locked in. We are ready for this."

The Owls' next game as of this writing will have been Monday, Feb. 28, against Southern New Hampshire University in the quarterfinals of the NE10 Conference tournament.

"It's great," Fressle said. "Game one done. Three more to go. And we're ready for it."
