

University drops mask mandate lift April 4 this is how the students feel

As of April 4, the mask mandate will be lifted for the university.

"This afternoon, Connecticut State Colleges and Universities (CSCU) President Terrence Cheng announced that, as of April 4, all Connecticut community colleges and state universities will no longer require masking on campus. In addition, all weekly testing requirements for employees and students will end at that time," according to an email from Patrick Dilger.

This announcement came on March 10, during Spring Break.

"I don't have a strong opinion about it (the mask mandate), but it's about time they did lift it," environmental studies and sustainability major, Rianna Albert, a junior said.

As of March 7, New Haven has lifted the mask mandate, but stores and restaurants have their own mandates.

"I have mixed feelings

about the mask mandate being lifted. While it shows that hopefully the pandemic is nearly over, I just am worried that the cases will skyrocket. Plus, I am immunocompromised, and masks made me feel more comfort-

able attending my classes. I will be continuing to wear my mask until at least the end of the semester," comprehensive special education major, Giana Cardonita, a junior said.

Cardonita said that

she hopes that the cases will stay the same, or decrease, but she noticed that when other states lifted the mandates the cases spiked so she is worried about that.

"that's going to happen in any town or campus

(COVID-19 cases spiking) that does life the mandate however these amount of future cases won't be as significant," Albert said.

Psychology major, Jacob Adorno, a junior said that he is apprehensive with the lift.

"Some commuters may not feel the same weight of having to undergo the safety precautions that residence do because they live at home," Adorno said.

Adorno said that if someone lives out of state and gets exposed, they cannot leave same with those who live on campus or at home who will also have to quarantine.

"As someone who hasn't gotten Covid since the school shut down, I feel like I have done everything I could to be careful and make those around me feel comfortable," Adorno said.

While he thinks this, he said he does not think it is a good idea for the entire campus to be unmasking.

"I think it's too soon," Adorno said.

Cardonita said that as someone who is immunocompromised, she is worried about what will happen.

"I am going to probably have to double mask and there may be times I may not feel comfortable going to class as a result," Cardonita said.


Unfortunately, many students cannot

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Eazy music video and Kanye West's backstory

The Game and Kanye West recently released a black and white music video featuring disturbing animations for their single "Eazy," and there is a long story behind it.

Kim Kardashian, reality star and West's ex-wife, filed for divorce with West back in January 2021. West was not letting her go which led them to go to court and finally Kardashian was able to finalize the divorce over a year later.

During this time, Kardashian started dating Saturday Night Live host Pete Davidson which led West to start posting many things on Instagram including him and Kardashian's private texts, many religious statements, claiming he is not allowed to see the kids and threatening Davidson, while creating the name "Skete," all while referring to Kardashian as his wife and dating Julia Fox.

When you think about it, it is a little scary that not even a woman who is rich and famous can easily get divorced, even when she is being stalked and harassed by him online. West even bought the house across the street from Kardashian and is now seen with Kim Kardashian lookalikes, including

Chaney Jones.

Kardashian kept most of this private, but actually recently fired back telling him to let go of the narrative that he is not allowed to see the kids.

"Please stop with this narrative, you were just here this morning picking up the kids for school," Kardashian wrote on an Instagram comment.

West also recently posted something naming his kid's school because he did not want them going to "that godless school" anymore.

In this post, he also added how disgusted he was that Kim allows their daughter to sing about being "in love with an emo girl," on the social media app Tik Tok. West posted screenshots of his daughter in the Tik Tok wearing dark makeup for the video.

The song, Emo Girl, by Machine Gun Kelly and Willow Smith is a very popular Tik Tok audio at the moment and MGK is even good friends with North's aunt.

Kardashian has since deleted the Tik Tok and they have yet to post on the app since.

In a now-deleted video, West claims he was mainly mad at this because it does not follow his religion. West also claims Tik Tok and Disney are "not allowed to use" his daughter, North.

West even posted a now

deleted screenshot of his texts with someone that showed he would be okay if it was his son Saint using the app, but since it was one of his daughters Kardashian is "using it against" him to "pull on his heartstrings." North is his oldest child.

The Tik Tok account, @kimandnorth, is an account where North West is allowed to make Tik Tok videos, as most girls her age do, while her mom, Kim Kardashian, fully monitors this account, features in almost all of the videos, has turned the comments feature off and does not allow her daughter to go live.

West did not seem to have a problem with this, at least publicly, until Kardashian started dating Davidson.

Many Twitter users point out how Kardashian is doing a good job letting her daughter have that creative freedom, yet restricting it so it is safe for her. Others believe West has a right to not let his daughter on Tik Tok, however, he allows her to be in Instagram posts, "Keeping Up With the Kardashians" TV show, on YouTube with Jojo Siwa and he allowed her on stage during his Yeezy show.

@herban_lengend wrote on Twitter, "North was on social media's when him and Kim were still together tho. It's a control tactic. Ye

Because of this recent "Eazy" video, West said what he created is art and they cannot restrict his art and creativity, yet he is doing it to his daughter.

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


Duke will have to survive the Texas Tech Red Raiders this Thursday in order to advance.

If you have not heard by now, Deshaun Watson is the Cleveland Browns new quarterback.

Cleveland traded three first round picks in order to land the young superstar who currently has 22 different women suing him for sexual misconduct.

The Browns gave him \$230 million guaranteed over five years, or you could look at it as over \$10 million per accuser.

The most jarring part of the situation was how much power and say Watson had.

University sports break refresher

Baseball

Owls' baseball is off to a hot start after opening the season down south with games in Florida and South Carolina.

They could not have asked for a better start to the season, jumping out to a perfect 9-0 record, but have come back to earth a bit dropping three of their last seven games to put their record at 13-3 as of this writing.

Although conference play has yet to begin in the NE10, the Owls have the highest winning percentage (0.813%) of any team in the conference to this point.

The offensive production for the Owls has been the most impressive aspect, as they have scored 10 or more runs six times already and are undefeated when scoring at least seven runs.

Owls' baseball will next take the field on Saturday, March 26 on the road against the College of Saint Rose. The team has yet to play its home opener which will take place on April 2.

Softball

Owls' softball began over spring break with the team playing its first eight games in Winter Haven, Fla. and finishing with a 4-4 record.

Catcher Jacqueline Dumont, a senior, leads the team in home runs (2) runs batted in (7) and total bases (17) and is tied for the team lead in hits (9) with infielder Katrina Roy, a sophomore.

As the Owls fly north, their first matchup will be a doubleheader against Post University on the road on Monday, March 21.

Despite the .500% record, softball has outscored their opponents 34-27 in the first eight games. A positive run differential is a promising sign as the season ramps up.

Following Monday's doubleheader, softball enters a three-game homestand which begins with another doubleheader on Wednesday, March 23, against Saint Thomas Aquinas, a team they defeated 8-2 in Fla. earlier in the season.

Rowe is currently tied with attacker Bayleigh Takacs, a senior, for the team leader in goals, as each has scored 10 goals apiece to this point.

Takacs has recorded at least one goal in every game this season.

The Owls will look to improve on their 1-3 record when they take the road yet again to play Pace University on Wednesday, March 23.

Owls' Gymnastics competed all over the East Coast during spring break with meets in Maryland, New Hampshire and Rhode Island.

It culminated in the Inaugural Gymnastics East Conference Championship where the Owls placed fifth out of eight schools.

Although a fifth-place finish may not sound like a tremendous feat on the surface, look closer.

The team's meet score of 194.200 broke the program's previous record of 192.800 set in February 2020.

In the process, gymnastics also broke the program's record on the vault which they themselves set back in February 2021 and the program's bars record with a score of 48.625, breaking the previous record set back in 2019.

Up next for gymnastics is the NCAA East Regional Championship set for Friday, April 1 as the Owls look to build off their record-breaking performance.

Track & Field

Men's track and field head coach John Wallin was named East Region Men's Coach of the Year, an honor voted on by the US Track Field and Cross Country Coaches' Association following the completion of the 2022 NCAA DII Indoor Track & Field Championships in Pittsburgh, Kan. Which concluded on March 12.

2022 marked Wallin's eighth time winning the honor for indoor track.

For outdoor track, which begins Thursday, March 24, Wallin has won East Region Men's Coach of the Year nine times and will begin the outdoor season in search of his historic tenth time.

Freshman Ella Maclean was named NE10 Women's Track Rookie of the Year for the indoor season, the announcement was made on March 10.

Both the men's and women's track and field teams will travel to Raleigh, NC to begin the outdoor season with a meet at NC State.
