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## Students attend a narcan training session

With the concerning rise in overdoses and deaths caused by fentanyl, the National Student Nursing Association (NSNA) are taking steps to combat this epidemic.

On Thursday, alumnus and the director of the Alliance for Prevention and Wellness, Pamela Mautte, hosted a Narcan Training event for students on the third floor of the Health and Human Services building.

The Alliance for Prevention and Wellness, according to their website, is the Regional Behavioral Health Action Organiza-

tion (RBHAO) serving the South-Central region of Connecticut. Their role is to raise awareness and provide advocacy to the public related to mental health, substance abuse prevention, treatment and recovery.

"We deliver our services utilizing the Strategic Prevention Framework, which is a data-driven, evidence-based prevention model developed by Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) for substance abuse, suicide and gambling problem prevention and promotion of mental health."

The training for Naloxone, more commonly known as Narcan, revolved around

training students on what symptoms to look for and what to do in case of a person is overdosing on opioids. Opioids including heroin, OxyContin, methadone, morphine, Percocet, fentanyl and Vicodin.

Symptoms can include an unresponsive and unconscious person, blue lips or fingernails, shallow or slow breathing and seizures or convulsions.

In a case of an overdose, it's always best to call the police first and stay with the person if you can. While you wait for the ambulance, put the person on their side to prevent them from choking on their own vomit. If the person isn't breathing, it's best to give them CPR; make sure there

is nothing in their mouth first. Finally, it's best to administer Narcan if you have it.

Victoria Deluca, a junior nursing student, said about how valuable this training is:

"It's important for our club to hold this event, even though it's just for nursing students. Drug use has always been peaks and valleys. We are kind of going into a peak now. So for us to hold this event we are giving out the necessary skills to save someone's life."

Narcan is designed to help reverse the effects of an opioid overdose in minutes.

"It's important to teach people how to use Naloxone on all signs and symptoms," said Mautte.

"It's especially important for college students to know because so much of our illicit drug supply is contaminated with Fentanyl."

Fentanyl is a powerful synthetic opioid that is 50 to 100 times more potent than Morphine. Though it is also used as a prescription drug, Fentanyl has become more active in our streets. It has steadily become the most common drug involved in drug overdose deaths in the United States, according to drugfreect.org.

Mautte highlighted the importance of the Narcan training: "It's really important with the amount of accidental overdoses that are happening in Connecticut.

We train people properly on how to properly administer Narcan and use Narcan in case there is an emergency."

Within the last year, there have been more than 1500 overdoses in Connecticut and over 100,000 nationwide.

A drug that can be laced into anything, Fentanyl has been making a climb to infamy as it is ingested by unsuspecting customers. Marijuana, marijuana edibles, methamphetamines, cocaine and MDMA are drugs that can all be laced and cause involuntary overdoses.

"We want to help the population and that's what we want to do as nurses," said Deluca. "This training is a step in that direction."

## Commuter students can pay for 25 meal swipes

Commuters at the university can sign up for meal plans like residents but also have specially discounted commuter options.

According to a data set from the Fall of 2021, 75% of undergraduate students commute or live off campus. Those students can enroll in a meal plan for the semester, so they can eat food at various dining hubs on campus.

"Honestly, I would say it's probably just the money. I don't feel like spending \$200 or \$300 when I could easily go to the Subway or McDonald's and pick up something for \$5," said Craig Huydic, a commuter student.

Marketing manager Nina DiNicola said, "If you're going to be on campus anyways, a meal plan is a great way to save money. It's a great way to connect with other students."

Marketing meal plans to commuter students can be a difficult task. Commuters may not feel it is worth the price depending on their situation. Sodexo

and the university are making consistent efforts to market meal plans to commuters.

General manager of Food Services Anthony DeLuca said, "I think the early engagement with families when they first come to campus is key."

"Social media is key, of course. We also do digital signage throughout our dining locations," said DiNicola. "We tend to do promotions in order to get students buy."

Sodexo, the university's dining provider, offers numerous plans for commuter students. The plans range from \$248 to \$601.

Commuter meal plans are offered in "blocks". Those plans range from 25, 40 and 80 blocks. 25 blocks being the cheapest option and 80 blocks being the most expensive. Commuter block plans roll over from the fall semester into the spring. They could be used for a guest as well.

Following the end of the year, like residential students, commuters have the option to donate their swipes to those who are food insecure.

"The commuter meal

plans that they purchase; we call them block plans. Traditionally, they will equal to much less than the door price at Conn. Hall," said DeLuca.

Commuter students have the opportunity to enroll in meal plans that are traditionally used by students who live on campus. Those plans range from \$398 to \$3,058.

Those plans offer students a designated number of meals per semester or per week based on the plan they purchase.

Students who are full residents without a kitchen in their dorms can get 15 meals per week for \$2,978.

Residents who have kitchens can purchase meal plans on a meal-per-semester basis. 25 meals per semester at \$398 is the cheapest option. While 80 meals per semester at \$751 is the most expensive option.

Huydic said, "I guess it would just be more swipes. More food than the 25 meals per semester. An extra cool feature for us commuters that makes it special, so it's not just something anyone can get."

## Student's react to Royal Family and Queen Elizabeth's death

The death of Queen Elizabeth II took the world by storm Thursday, Sept. 8. According to royal.uk, Queen Elizabeth reigned for almost 71 years. This makes her the longest reigning British monarch of all time. However, the reactions to her death were very mixed. For many, this was an opportunity to bring awareness to the problems within the monarchy. A senior Scottish exchange student at the university, Nicole Harkness, said, "It is completely corrupt; there's racism. They

have covered up sexual assault." This refers to the controversies surrounding the Royal Family. The Duchess of Sussex, Meghan Markle, has recently loosened ties with the Royal Family because of poor treatment and alleged racist remarks. The Duke of York, Prince Andrew, had spent millions on a settlement involving his ties with Jeffrey Epstein. Markle's rocky relationship with the Royal family has brought about comparisons to the late Princess Diana of Wales. There is a divide between fans of Markle and Diana and those who feel loyal towards the Royal Family. "Growing up, I definitely preferred Princess Diana," said Harkness. "I know there's a lot of controversy around that." Diana's tragic death led to a lot of rumors involving unethical practices going on within the family. Many felt the timing of Diana's death was suspicious. Before her divorce from who is

now King Charles III, she had been seen as not royal enough. Harkness has experienced this split within her home in the UK. "There's definitely a split, there are people who worship the queen and think she is the greatest thing on earth," said Harkness. "The other half is people who don't really look up to her that much." The Royal Family has much more power than many seem to know. Their key role, politically, is diplomacy. They are the ones to welcome world leaders to the UK. According to royal.uk, Queen Elizabeth had welcomed over 100 presidents and prime ministers. "They don't have a huge impact on policy," said The President of SCSU Republicans, Madelyn Dean. "But they do have public influence, which I think is underrated." There has been debate that this should finally be the opportunity for the monarchy to end for good.

Many view it as outdated, as it is leaders who exist purely because of the family they were born into. "That money could be put toward other things like homelessness and helping people with drug and alcohol rehabilitation," said Harkness. Harkness is not alone in this opinion. Many have been calling for reform, especially in a time where people in the UK are worried about upcoming economic issues. However, Americans have been having a tough time determining how another country should go about their government. "As an American, I support democratically elected heads of the State," said Gross. "As it pertains to the UK, I don't think it's my say-to-say what kind of government they should have." It is difficult to know what course of action would be best for a place like the UK, which has rapidly changed leadership in the past month. Just two days before Queen Elizabeth's death,



Liz Truss is from the Conservative Party that the three prime ministers before her were also leaders of. This being Boris Johnson, Theresa May and David Cameron. Truss' leadership will not be a drastic change to UK politics. "King Charles is very interested in environmental issues," said Gross. "With a conservative government, like Liz Truss's, he might be able to make an impact." Many have recognized the possible benefits of the split of powers in the UK. The Royal Family focuses on representation and diplomacy. The Prime Minister and Parliament focus on legislation. "That person can focus on their role without having to smile and wave at all the cameras," said Dean.

According to a 15-year SCSU parking attendant, Charles Johnson, there is plenty of parking for students and there should be less complaints about the issue.

“They have five parking garages. You go to the first floor and there is a shuttle that will take you anywhere,” said Johnson. Johnson added that if students are parked in the wrong area, then the police would have to ticket and tow the car.

According to the SCSU Shuttle Bus Service homepage, the goal is to be “co-operative safety-oriented transportation service, offered to the SCSU community through the University Police Department.”

The shuttle bus had designated times and a weekly

schedule to help students get to class every day.

According to the SCSU Shuttle Bus Schedule website, the full campus route purpose is to help be a reliable form of transportation for students. The shuttle buses route provides their services to each stop every 20 minutes.

Johnson added that there is a designated area for students to get dropped off in the faculty parking lot on Fitch Street.

Some students have different point of views about the parking on campus. The point of views varies based on status —graduates, full-time and part-time students.

Samira Zuniga, a graduate student, says she experienced parking differently as an undergraduate.

“I would say that commuting specifically with parking was interesting in the sense that I would have class all the way in Davis, because I’m an elementary major and that’s where most education classes are,” Zuniga said.

Zuniga added that if the

A junior psychology major, and commuter, Daila Smith, said there should be improvements to help students get to class. Smith said there are never spaces available closer to classrooms. According to Smith, her friends constantly complain about the current parking situation.

“Wintergreen is very far and so usually, even though it’s a huge parking lot, there is never parking,” said Smith.

According to the SCSU Commuter Committee website, they want all commuters to get involved and provide feedback on ways to improve the college experience for commuters.

“The commuter committee meets every Wednesday at 1 p.m. in Room 301 of the Adanti Student Center,” according to the SCSU Commuter Committee website. “We also invite students to attend committee meetings to share input on how the commission can better tend to commuter student issues.”

"I'm really proud of our players because it was a very physical and competitive game," Head Coach Adam Cohen said.

"They worked really, really hard, so I give them

Coming into the game, the Owls had seen the Golden Knights before. Last year the Owls and the Golden Knights matched up in the Northeast 10 conference tournament finals where the Owls lost 1-0.

With the tie the Owls overall record moves to 4-2-1, and they remain unbeaten in NE10 conference play at 2-0-1.

Needing desperately to move the sticks and keep the drive alive, Davis bounces it to the outside as Pace's defense crashes into the middle.

Eichman was a big key to success for the Owls defense because he was flying all over the field.

As a result, he finished the game with two forced fumble, and he led the Owls in tackles with 12. Although Eichman had a good game, a defense does not perform well solely because of one person.

Junior inside linebacker

Hassan Dominick added eight tackles with one being a sack, and senior defensive end Cameron Kelly added another sack and two tackles.

"I feel like I had a good game, but at the of the day we still lost, so that's all that's going through my mind," Eichman said.

The Owls offense could not get much on the board aside from Davis's big touchdown run which was the only score the Owls put on the board.

The Owls ended up losing the game 27-7.

"Pace came out and played excellent in all phases of the game," Head Football Coach Tom Godek said. "They took advantage of some of our weaknesses."

The Owls are looking to use the loss as motivation.

"Obviously we don't want to lose by three touchdowns," Davis said.

"It's that chip on our shoulder that's going to make us thrive and be better as a unit."

Next week, the Owls travel north to New Hampshire to play another NE10 conference matchup against Saint Anselm College.

Coming into the game, Saint Anselm sits at an undefeated record of 2-0 blowing out both Millersville University and American International College. In a matchup last year against Saint Anselm, the Owls came out on top 34-31.

"There's going to be a lot of work to do here heading into a very good Saint Anselm's team next week," Coach Godek said.
