Administrators injured causing EV scooter ban on campus

In December, Ophelie Rowe-Allen, dean of students, sent an email to the school that said "the University has decided to ban electric scooters and other electric transportation devices, such as hoverboards and e-skateboards, from campus, effective December 21, 2023."

The email said the school will be banning electric scooters and other electric transportation devices because university leaders have "become increasingly concerned" with the devices since they are powered by a lithium-ion battery.

That is a lie.

The real reason electric scooters and other electric transportation devices have been banned is because our very own interim president of the university, Sheahon Zenger, was injured in an after-hours scooter race that up to now has gone unreported-on. While at work, Zenger witnessed plenty of students riding their electric scooters aimlessly around campus without a care in the world and unnamed sources we just made up said he was furious that he couldn't ride his scooter while healing from his injuries.

Meeting with Rowe-Allen, the duo decided to ban electric scooters and other electric transportation devices on campus to ruin the fun for everyone out of spite.

SCOTUS bans DEI, suddenly everyone is a white man

As DEI programs in many states have been shut down, others aiming to preserve the protection of diverse members of academic and professional communities have taken to try and earn legal protection of their programs.

Samuel Williamson has stood at the forefront of this cause and rallied a number of DEI leaders across the country for the cause. He said, "We can't all turn out like Texas, right?"

The night following the SCOTUS ruling, the sun set over streets lined with mud stained picket signs as the beauty of America's melting pot went to rest before another day of fighting for basic protective rights.
